BusseLton Jetty!




It is a very long jetty over

- Birds and fish




It's okay if it feels busy. I can hold someone's hand or take a break if I need to.

There are toilets at the Interpretive Centre and Underwater Observatory




There are water fountains to refill my water bottle and seats to sit on if I need a rest

If I feel tired, scared, or need a break, that's okay.




I can:

There may be other people with us in our carriage, so I will try to sit still and keep my body in my space.






Riding the Jetty Train



When the train is ready to go the driver will blow a whistle.




The train might make some noise and it rocks and jolts, but that's okay because it is a fun safe way to travel.
